# N.E. Opens Biggest Race Month

The high country snow pack has gone up another six inches to a foot as a fitting prelude to one of the biggest race months in New England skiing history. It opens this weekend with one national and two sectional championships, plus a host of lesser events and the "good to excellent" tag now displayed at every area.

The excitement kicks off Thursday at Maine's Sugarloaf Mountain with the NCAA championships. More than 100 athletes from 16 colleges, coast to coast, begin a three-day four-event team meet for the national intercollegiate ski title on Thursday, Friday and Saturday, followed by the annual Sugarloaf Slalom Sunday, which rates as an Olympic qualification competition.

### Old Timers, Too

On Friday, Saturday and Sunday at New Hampshire's Gunstock Ski Area, some 100 junior racers from all six New England states, New York and Pennsylvania, who have survived regional qualification meets will battle for Eastern Junior Alpine individual championship titles in downhill, slalom and giant slalom.

The top 10 boys and eight girls in this three-day grind also win berths on the Eastern junior team which will compete in the Junior Nationals at Stowe the following weekend.

The third title event, somewhat overshadowed by the national college show and the youngsters fighting their way up toward places in the senior racing sun, will be the old timers who started all this ruckus back in the early 30's.

Veteran skiers in four age groups from 27 to 50 years and over will compete Saturday in the Eastern Veterans giant slalom championship race on Cannon Mountain to be run concurrently with the 31st annual Invitational Challenge Cup team race of Boston's Ski Club Hochgebirge.

### Ski Chatter

It is the oldest race of its kind in the country, dating back to 1931 when it was first run on the Mount Moosilauke Carriage Road. Two years later it was moved to the then new Taft trail on Cannon, where it has been a Franconia fixture ever since, except for suspension during the World War II years, and in 1949, 1957 and 1961 because of poor snow conditions.

That first Challenge Cup race was won by the Dartmouth Outing Club team of Charles Proctor, John P. Carlton and T. B. "Ted" Farwell. The DOC still leads with 10 team victories. The "Hochies" have won nine times, Middlebury College three times, the Wildcat Mountain Ski Club twice. One-time winners have been the Aspen Ski Club, U. S. Armed Forces, Woodstock Ski Runners, University of New Hampshire, the Eastern Slope Ski Club and Franconia Ski Club.

### Tight Turns

Two more unique events on the weekend card are the Mad River Glen Family tournament, now in its 14th year, which has attracted more than a score of family giant slalom performers, and the first Eastern Ski-Form Tournament at Otis Ridge whose competitors will be judged on skiing form. Both are scheduled for Saturday.

Mount Washington Valley residents are still chuckling over that snow forecast of "in excess of four inches" for last Thursday's storm. It dumped 24½ inches on Mount Washington, most of which wound up on the East snowfields and in Tuckerman Ravine for spring skiing; 17 inches on Wildcat and 16 to 18 inches on Cranmore, and more than a foot at Black Mt.
